Grade Level and Content Area Teachers developed a list of 5-10 Student Learning Targets (SLT'S) for DK-12th grade. This brochure is meant to help students and parents become familiar with each course and the intended outcomes upon completion.

Accordingly, Students will be able to...

Math

- count, identify, and write numbers 0-120
- understand place value (tens and ones)
- compare numbers by using greater than, less than, and equal to
- solve word/story problems using addition and subtraction
- add and subtract within 20 using a variety of strategies
- collect and interpret data (collect information, make, and answer questions about graphs)
- use non-standard objects to measure (unifix cubes, paper clips, hands)
- tell and write time to the hour/half-hour in digital and analog form
- · identify 2-D and 3-D shapes

English Language Arts

- ask and answer questions about a fictional and nonfictional text
- retell a story/text using beginning, middle, and end
- read first grade text, including high frequency words
- read grade-level text orally with accuracy, appropriate rate, understanding and expression
- ask and answer questions about information presented orally
- begin a sentence with a capital letter and end it with punctuation
- correctly spell words with grade-level spelling patterns
- write a personal narrative, opinion piece, and informational piece that is on topic with adult help

Science

- · show that vibrating materials make sound
- show that light is needed to see objects in darkness
- observe the effect of a beam of light shining on different objects
- design and build a device that uses light or sound to communicate
- use materials to show how plants and animals survive, grow, and meet needs
- understand how parents help their offspring survive
- describe the pattern of the sun, moon, and stars
